



The next pattern I want to demonstrate is the one that I play behind Ray's gr's solo. When I wrote "Streetwise," I was just getting into using two hi-he's really wanted to create rhythms that used "stereo-hats."





Practicing/Snare Strokes

My approach to practicing snare drum, or practice in general, is not to go hell-for-leather and be as quick as you can. I like to practice quite slowly and concentrate on the accuracy. I've found that if you spend a little time just being very accurate and even, the speed will start to come because the control will be much greater. I think it's good to push yourself occasionally as well, but to warm up; it's best to play evenly and relaxed. I'm going to take you through some exercises that I use to warm up and practice with. The first one is the single-stroke roll. Again, I'm going to start out very comfortably and evenly.
