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Alfred's Premier Piano Course Christmas Book 3 includes familiar Christmas pieces that reinforce concepts included in Lesson Book 3. The music continues the strong pedagogical focus of the course while providing the enjoyment of playing familiar music during the Christmas season.

Christmas Book 3 is not correlated page-by-page with Lesson Book 3, but the pieces use only the concepts that are introduced in Lesson Book 3. They are arranged in progressive order of difficulty, with the easiest pieces first, though it is not necessary to progress straight through the book.

Allowing students to study music they enjoy during the Christmas season is highly motivating. Consequently, reading and rhythm skills often improve greatly when studying holiday music. The authors hope that the music in Christmas Book 3 brings hours of enjoyment to this festive season. Merry Christmas!

The words for **O Little Town of Bethlehem** were written by Phillips Brooks, an Episcopal priest from Philadelphia. Inspired to write the words by a visit to Bethlehem, he asked Lewis Redner, an organist, to compose music for them. Redner claims that he was suddenly awakened by the song of angels. He wrote the melody in the middle of the night and filled in the harmony the next morning. The words and music were quickly printed on leaflets and sung by Sunday school children and their teachers at the Christmas service.

Jingle Bell Rock was first released as a recording in 1957, almost 100 years later than the song Jingle Bells, upon which it was based. It was one of the first Christmas songs to use rock music, but many today feel that it has a “country” flavor.
